FOOD FOR THE SOUL Signs of the Times

Franciscan priest Richard Rohr, in looking for a Biblical image that might describe the time in which we find ourselves, turns to the folk tale of Jonah. He says that **it feels like we are in the belly of a whale.**

It does feel like we have been swallowed by this whale of a virus, and like Jonah are wondering when we might be delivered to firmer ground. It was a time for new learning. Jonah learned that there was a high cost attached to running from the vision that God had for the world and that occasionally one needs a little softening up.

If that trapped feeling created by Covid-19 wasn't enough, another wave of grief that began in Portapique, Nova Scotia swept across the nation and into our hearts. With the combined grief came new learning. We learned about wet markets and the deadly consequences of pushing their boundaries. We learned about flattening the curve, about PPE and not having enough. We learned about test, track, trace and treat. We learned that early warnings save lives. We learned of the flaws in Long Term Care. What we did not learn and now may never, is what there is in, or missing from, a human being that would motivate such senseless carnage as happened in Nova Scotia.

We see the signs that emerge when words fail; broken hearts; hearts for Heidi; heart patterns from lit windows on empty office buildings. We see flowers and flags on makeshift memorials. We are moved by the rich heritage of Nova Scotian music; all signs of deep sadness and heart felt love.

Just when we were needing a hopeful sign from a world beyond Covid-19,

one came. A grand nephew was born! Two weeks later came the baby shower online gift registry. There were no toys, no clothes, just a list of book titles, bamboo baby bowls and boxes of "green" diaper detergent. We chose the bowls and the detergent. Our niece and nephew are determined to do all they can to see that if baby Theo needs to face another world crisis, it won't be an environmental one. If that means searching for biodegradable bowls and washing diapers, then so be it. That too, hopefully, is a sign of the times. If it is, the future is in good hands. GW

Thank God for our Young people and for Camp Tanner and Bimini Camp. Both Camps are trying to plan ahead knowing that this summer they will probably not be running the usual programs. This affects both staff and potential campers. It also affects groups like congregations, UCW's, Men's Groupsmany who give money to our camps regularly. Those who run the camps know that there are ongoing costs to maintain the property even when regular programs are not running. How do they get the facts out to those who would want to help?

Similarly, **Five Oaks** is not able to run its programs but still has expenses to meet.

We can all be thankful for the leadership of our Moderator and for all those on the national and regional staff. They are doing Trojan service as they try to install and develop a new structure in a Pandemic Year. The coincidence of doing both at once makes for a load only God can carry. All of us need to pray without ceasing and support one another.

OXFORD¹ LEGACY FUND

In November 2018, Oxford Presbytery created a Legacy Fund with half of the financial assets remaining as of the closing of presbyteries on Dec. 31, 2018. After all financial obligations were met, this Fund received approximately \$55,000, held now in trust by Antler River Watershed Regional Council (ARWRC).

Purpose of Fund

- 1. to promote the work of clusters and networks that include Oxford United Church communities of faith.
- 2. to provide financial support to candidates for ministry who are connected to Oxford United Church communities of faith.

Administration of Fund

That up to one-half of the original fund be allocated for financial support for Candidates for Ministry who are currently connected to Oxford.

That at least one-half of the original fund be allocated for the work of clusters/networks linked with Oxford.

That ARWRC appoint a Committee comprised of 4 people from Oxford - ideally 2 ministry personnel and 2 lay reps to the ARWRC and ideally representing both north of 401 and south of 401.

That this Committee's work would be in effect from Jan. 2019 to Dec. 2021 with an option in 2021 to request that ARWRC extend the mandate of the committee by one year to Dec. 2022. Any monies remaining at the end of the mandate of the Committee are to be turned over to the Regional Council as unrestricted funds.

Guidelines for Applications to the Fund

- 1. Clusters/Networks
- That grants be available to clusters/networks for proposals that would further the faithful work of

May 13, 2020 Page 5 of 11 clusters or networks that would include as part of their makeup Oxford communities of faith with a further requirement that these clusters/networks would include a minimum of 3 pastoral charges.

- 2. Financial Support for Candidates for Ministry
- That up to \$4000 per calendar year be available to each full-time student enrolled in a ministry pathway. That a pro-rated amount be available each calendar year for part-time students enrolled in a ministry pathway.

What Has Happened to Date

A committee of four (Lori Minler, Lloyd Bennett, Celia Orth and Lynne Dunlop) was appointed by ARWRC in November 2019.

This committee approved funding of \$4,000 to Christina Crawford and \$2,000 to Nancy Vandenberghe (pro-rated for 1 semester) for 2019 studies as candidates for ministry.

The committee has established guidelines for applications for the work of Clusters/Networks.

- To support the publication of <u>CONNECTIONS - news and views of</u> <u>Oxford County United Churches</u>, the monthly newsletter produced by Marg Murray and Glen Wright - e.g. online site licensing.
- To support the Friends of Oxford gatherings - e.g. guest speakers' expenses
- To support projects/special events of Clusters/Networks (a minimum of 3 pastoral charges).

As the Committee would like to be as fluid as possible in offering funding, they will accept requests at any time (no set deadlines) for funding of up to \$1,000 for

DIGGING DEEPER

"Q" The Hidden Gospel: Now, A New Source of Inspiration

As one Biblical Scholar put it, we know what went into "The Funnel" and what came out; but we don't know how it was mixed. For many centuries Biblical Scholars had followed the Augustinian hypothesis that the Gospel of Matthew was first; followed by Mark's Gospel and finally The Gospel of Luke. It was assumed both Mark and Luke used Matthew's Gospel in the construction of their own Gospels.

During the last two hundred years, Protestant Scholars have examined the two "Q" parallel passages found in the Gospel of Matthew and Gospel of Luke. By 1900 it was assumed by many that a major overhaul of The Gospel Tradition was due. The "Two-Source Hypothesis" was born. Both Mark and "Q" became a source for both Matthew's and Luke's Gospel. "Q" the Hidden Gospel was now in the spotlight.



What did "Q" the Hidden Gospel stand for? First there are no Birth Stories or Resurrection Stores. The Lord comes across as a modern up-to-date King Solomon or a very understanding Rabbi.

In "Q" the Hidden Gospel, Jesus, as The Wise Solomon or understanding Rabbi comes to these mud hut Galilean villagers who work their fields and the fishing villages nested by the Sea of Galilee. Into these communities come the new leaders bringing stories about how neighbours should act, how they should deal with fears, with the relations between

households, and the importance of helping one another.

Want an interesting Bible Study? Buy or borrow a copy of either "Q" The Lost Gospel or "The Gospel of Thomas" and study various passages from these books alongside passages from the "Bible". Yes, compare the Passages but also compare the ancient times and their challenges with the challenges we are facing to-day. Who says the Bible is out-of-date?

The Rev. Stan Stanhope (Editor's note. Thanks, Stan, for answering a 50-year-old question that I had. Why was Matthew and not Mark the first book in the New Testament? We can now blame it on Augustine. We know now that he was a 4th century victim of fake news. GW)

FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS

A long time ago, a Jewish woman, Esther had the ear of a king who had been fed 'fake news' to justify killing Jews. Esther risked her life to tell the truth answering the call that **she had been born for such a time as this**.

In this COVID pause we face serious challenges of neo-liberalism, empty pews, climate crisis as well as the pandemic. People are yearning for something different. It is a time to vision a new way forward. I joined the April 24, on-line conference, Eco-commoning-a Down to Earth Way of Life¹. The keynote speakers, Rev Dr. Ted Reeves (religious social ethicist) and the Very Rev. Bill Phipps (former moderator and climate justice activist) and all the participants were born for such a time as this.

Reeves' teachings on language, metaphors and framing from George Lakoff² were especially helpful. This field of cognitive linguistics explains how dialogue between liberals and conservatives has become increasingly difficult. Conservative and liberal (small 'c', small 'l') thinkers view or frame the world from strict parent and nurturant parent, respectively. Dialogue is hindered.

Metaphors like 'winners and losers' justify the 'survival of the fittest' and feed into neoliberal economics³ of the extreme individualism and of plundering mother earth. Alternatively, we can frame economics emphasizing а relational worldview where everything interconnected, respected and honoured. Communities of faith were brought into being for such a time as this.

Reeves also described how we can learn from our deep history (100,000 years!) through a cognitive lens as well as the ways in which Eco-commoning is already

May 13, 2020 Page 10 of 11 happening through and around us. I enjoyed the breakout sessions with groups of innovators coming from across Canada.

For Phipps, the climate crisis is spiritual and ethical. This pause allows us time to question what kind of future we want. Our job as faith communities is to provide alternative visions, alternative framing of how we see the world and live in the world. Ecocommoning responds to these.

On their Facebook page, Lynne Allin, Minister of Congregational Support and Mission recommended this article on the 7 shifts churches need to make because of the Coronavirus. Moving toward Pentecost and reflecting on why and how we live out our faith as individuals and congregations in this new reality, this article offers good questions to consider.
