The Future Church

What will the church of the future look like? Cameron Trimble, United Church of Christ pastor, author and CEO of The Centre for Progressive Renewal at Emory University, Atlanta, believes she knows. She bases her vision on what some churches are already doing. Cameron was brought to us on zoom by the Antler River Watershed Regional Council.

Trimble has observed, as have we, that because of the Covid-19 pandemic, churches have resorted to producing worship services online. Those who have opened those services to the wider community and world, have discovered that there are people out there who tune in. These new viewers are not just in Canada but around the world. Trimble believes that this will continue long after Covid-19 has been contained. She says that the message of the progressive church is so very suited to the needs of the world. The message is interactive and inclusive; it seeks justice and practises compassion.

But will these people support the church financially? Trimble reminded us that already 46% of US churches have facilities for online contributions. During one of the discussion sessions, one of the participants suggested that we did not need buildings or the institution and that perhaps we should get rid of the church as we know it and just follow Jesus. Trimble pointed out that at the heart of the church is the gathered

community. Without that we are not a church.

Trimble also reminded us of Phyllis Trickle's saying "that every 500 years the church has a rummage sale." Trimble suggested that this is happening. Churches are closing and buildings are being sold. The pandemic is accelerating this. Trimble says that this has given time for churches to reflect on their life and purpose and can lead to renewal.

You can hear an interview of Trimble with the Raven Foundation called <u>"Piloting</u> Church: Helping your Church take Flight,"







A warm welcome to Sherpherd and his family from readers and editors of CONNECTIONS. It is difficult for all of us these days but especially for any minister who moves

under these circumstances.

Rev Sherpherd Munikwa was **born in Nyajena district, Masvingo province in Zimbabwe.** He is the 5th born in a family

of six to the late Mr and Mrs Mudemba Munikwa who were devoted Protestant Christians and members of the Reformed Church in Zimbabwe.

After high school he moved to Triangle a nearby Sugar production area, where he stayed for seven years. Sherpherd's seven years in Triangle were like Moses' years in the Median wilderness when he was attending Jethro's flock. There were years of spiritual training and growth, faith formation widened and deepened in Jesus Christ. The Lord spoke to Sherpherd vividly in many different ways starting from the age of 21. In Triangle he served the church like any other full member of the church, he led Sunday Services, taught Catechism, led youth groups and participate in evangelism outreaches as well as performing any duty in the church as assigned by the Church Council or by the Minister.

In 2000 he couldn't resist God's calling into the full-time ministry as a ministry personnel, he went for training at Murray Theological College for four years. In 2004, he was ordained as a Minister of Word, Sacrament and Pastoral Care in Chinhoyi Congregation where he served up to 2013. During his years in Chinhovi he served the Reformed Church in Zimbabwe and the community at large in various positions: Presbytery Youth Coordinator, Presbytery Actuary, Presbytery Synodical Committee Representative, Theological College Board of Governors Secretary and Zimbabwe Council of Churches member. Sherpherd loves his studies so much. He studied with the Zimbabwe Open University, with Justo **Mwale University in Zambia and with Atlantic** School of Theology.

In July 2013 Sherpherd started as an Ecclesiological Lecturer at Murray Theological College of the Reformed Church in Zimbabwe up to April 2014. He moved to the United Church of Canada in 2014 with his wife Adline and their three girls, Inzwirashe Grace, Kupakwashe Rejoice and Tovimbanashe Joyce. He went through the admission process until he was admitted on May, 05, **2016.** He served as the Minister of Word. Sacrament and Pastoral Care in Carmanville Pastoral Charge in Newfoundland where he started on April 7, 2014 to June 30, 2020. He survived winters Newfoundland, seven in where he came with his family as strangers and they left as family members because of the great love, and hospitality caring **Newfoundlanders.** That's where they consider home away from home as of now. They listened to God's calling and joined Dundas Street United Church in Woodstock on July 01, 2020. **Due to these uncertain** days, it was not a good and hospitable move. There are no people outdoors, church activities and communal gatherings are in slow motion. If it were not for the love and care of Dundas Street United Church family, it would be too difficult for the family. Rev Sherpherd and his family are hoping that things will be all right soon by God's grace. There is no storm which lasts forever. Face Protection and Smaller Classes, PLEASE!

The following is the letter, August 22, 2020, written prior to the Thames Valley School Board's decision to make masks mandatory for grades JK to grade three. It was sent to Mr. Ernie Hardeman, MLA, Oxford, to Stephen Lecce, Ontario Minister of Education with a copy to William McKinnon, Oxford's representative on the Thames Valley Board of Education.

With grandchildren in grades one, three, seven and nine, I am more than a little concerned about their return to school during this Covid-19 pandemic. I am pleased by the steps that your government has taken and encouraged by your words so often repeated: "We will do everything in our power to see that our children are kept safe." That says to me that your plans are a work in progress and that you are open to further suggestions. I have two.



The first is to supply plastic face shields for those students from JK to grade three. A face shield was mentioned by Dr. Peter

Lin as an effective mask alternative. It is most curious that for the children least likely to understand or practice social distancing, children with their hands on and into most everything, you provide no personal protective equipment. The adjustment to plastic face shields would be relatively easy. They are not hot like a mask and the teachers probably wear them. They are easy to clean, and the face is revealed. In a time of increased stress, to be able to read facial expressions is vital for both teachers and students.

The second suggestion you have heard many times. Cut the class sizes. You

have said in so many ways that groups of fewer numbers are safer. If this applies to adults who understand and respect social distancing, how much more does it apply to children who may not. If you can't come up with the funds for all elementary school grades, apply this to the junior grades.

If you are unwilling to increase the deficit, raise our taxes. What is money when lives can be saved - or lost? Though I have not taken a survey, I believe that the people of Ontario also want to "do everything in their power to see that our children are kept safe."

I look forward to your response.

Wrestling is Where the Blessing Begins

Rev Karen Low has been on medical leave since March 2019. Personally, I have been blessed with her ministry – which started



with wrestling. We've included her thoughtful letter of resignation to the Congregation of Innerkip Pastoral Charge (effective

October 31, 2020). MM

So often, over these many months, I have been reminded of poet Jan Richardson's piece entitled "Jacob's Blessing". "If this easy," blessing were Richardson writes, "anyone could claim it. As it is, I'm here to tell you that it will take some work." She goes on to say, "This is the blessing that visits you in the struggling, in the wrestling, in the striving. This is the blessing that comes after you have left everything behind, after you have stepped out, after you have crossed into that realm beyond every landmark you have known."

Since taking my leave from you last year, I have scuffled with health concerns that prompted major surgery and grappled with the lingering impact on my body and my spirit. I have contended, as we all have, with the COVID-19 restrictions and the recognition that I fall within vulnerable categories. I have tussled with the increasing needs of two aged and muchloved parents. And I have wrestled with the questions, "What now?" "What next?"

"It's not that this blessing is so difficult, as if it were not so filled with grace or with the love that lives in every line. It's simply that it requires you to want it, to ask for it, to place yourself in its path."

It is in the pause between the rounds that I have heard the call that the time has

come for me to step into retirement – a place from which I might better be able to tend to the needs of my family and my soul, and to discern the grace that lies in the journey both taken and yet to come.

My decision to retire has not come easily. I miss being a part of you. I miss the flow of the seasons of the church and the striving to bring something of the Divine amongst you.

I thank you for the welcome you provided to both Annie and me and the gifts of your presence with which you continue to bless the Church and the wider community. The world around you is richer for it.

As I continue to try to regain ground lost since my leave-taking (and replace the 40 lbs. that went with it), it is my hope that retirement will bring renewed inspiration for innovative forms of service in the future.

I wish all of you blessed days ahead, both as a Charge and as God's beloved. Perhaps you too will find yourself wrestling with some of the same questions: "What now?" or "What next?" I can do no better than leave you with Jan's closing words of Jacob's Blessing ... "So when this blessing comes, born in the hands of the difficult angel who has chosen you, do not let go. Give yourself into its grip. It will wound you, but I tell you there will come a day when what felt to you like limping was something more like dancing as vou moved into the cadence of vour new and blessed name."

As you go dancing, I bid you peace ... Rev. Karen E. Low

The F.T.D. Club

The story of Moses standing with arms outstretched to part the water of the Red Sea...people, once slaves, risk the walk to freedom... becoming exhausted holding his arms up...others in the camp seeing his fatigue...stepping up to hold up his arms.

As Bob Giuliano preached an Anniversary Service of a rural church, he was touched by the young women bringing their children to celebrate with their beloved young woman minister. He wrote this article. MM

"...I was reminded of many years ago when my mother was minister of **two little churches in the Ohio Valley**. During the Second Great War, when the men had gone off to Europe and the Pacific, **my mother was left with a town full of young mothers with little kids and a lot of fear.** As a matter of fact she was one **with** them. Her husband, my dad, had gone off to war with the men of his church, unable



to remain behind. So she too, for five years, lived on the edge of life, smelling the smoke of battle in her dreams.

In those days our house was full of young women. My mother gathered them for regular meetings where hey could talk of their loneliness and the anxieties they suffered about the war. They helped one another with the red tape of government and the postal services. They gathered to make socks and cookies and letters of hope to send to the front lines. Mom guided them in learning to pray and helped them cook and sew.

They met once a week, were on the phone often and named themselves the F.T.D. (For The Duration) Club. It was a common expression in those days which you will remember; 'Duration" was а temporary designation of the war. So, for the duration, they gathered and held one another when the telegrams "Wounded in Action," "Missing in Action, Presumed Dead" and finally "Killed in Action." She led them in their support and care for each other and she led them to the graves high on the hill overlooking the Valley and the river, where the bodies of their men were sent to rest. Most difficult of all, I suspect, she helped them accept the dark news when there was only a small package of a man's belongs and a letter from his commanding officer. Their lover had been left to be buried on foreign soil.

...I was taken back to the parlor of our small parsonage where I, as a young kid, listened in on the singing and laughter and the fun of the F.T.D. Club. Although I was too young to realize it then I remember the gift that our home became to those who sometimes came by themselves to confess their loneliness and their weariness in the war.

The day came when the F.T.D. Club's minister received the feared telegram too: "Wounded in Action." The young women came with pies and casseroles and held their minister friend while she trembled in their love and her fear. They held her arms aloft day after day while she parted the waters for other to walk to freedom."



"How can you know all these facts [about climate change] and still have hope?" For me, faith and hope are rooted in the conviction that, regardless of how bad things may be, a new story is waiting to take hold—something we have not yet seen or felt or experienced. God is calling us—as individuals and congregations—to work with God and others to champion that new story.

For the vast majority in our society, that new story remains unseen. Wresting our future from the grip of fossil fuel seems impossible—our addiction is too strong, affordable options are too few, and the powers that defend the status quo are mighty, indeed. We cannot be



freed by chipping away at this millstone. We must begin to live into a new story by changing the human prospect [of destruction] and restoring

creation's viability.

We become partners with God when we act in unfamiliar, untested ways. Those new actions will be guided by a preferred future that embraces:

- resilience in place of growth
- collaboration in place of consumption
- wisdom in place of progress
- balance in place of addiction
- moderation in place of excess
- vision in place of convenience
- accountability in place of disregard
- self-giving love in place of selfcentered fear.

God dreams of a time when love and mutual respect will bind humanity together, and the profound beauty of creation will be treasured. Let us embrace God's dream as our own. Suddenly, the horizon of our hope comes nearer. As we live into God's dream, we will rediscover who we truly are and all of creation will be singing.

PETITIONS CPJ (CITIZENS FOR PUBLIC JUSTICE)- Petition (open till Oct. 6)

One of the lessons from the current crisis is that there is profound wisdom in Indigenous teachings about the interconnectedness of all creation. Respecting this interconnectedness is critical for ecological and economic integrity, right relations with Indigenous peoples, and for a holistic, just recovery from the pandemic.

CPJ shares their latest paper, *Restoring Indigenous Rights*, an exploration of how implementing the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples can advance climate justice in Canada. Drawing on the invaluable insights of Indigenous activists it seeks to place the sovereign rights of Indigenous Peoples at the heart of CPJ's work for climate justice.

In order to carry this work forward, CPJ has joined the **Ecumenical Circle on the UN Declaration**. Also, through our collaboration with Canadian faith communities in the **For the Love of Creation** climate initiative, we have launched an <u>e-petition</u> that calls on the Government of Canada to:

- Reduce GHG emissions by 60% below 2005 levels by 2030 through a just transition;
- Honour the rights of Indigenous Peoples; and
- Support climate action and pandemic response in the Global South.

Are We Ready to Open?

As communities of faith consider reopening, it can be difficult to know where to begin. Various sources of information on the internet vary in accuracy and can be overwhelming.

We advise that you consult with your <u>local health unit</u>. This is particularly important as restrictions and requirements vary between communities.

This checklist is to help get you started by identifying some general things to consider as you create your own reopening policy and procedures. It is not an official or exhaustive list, and it is based on the information available as of July 2020. There are several links included, but again your own local health unit and the Ontario government resources are your best sources of information.
