FOOD FOR THE SOUL SEARCHING FOR HOPE IN A TIME OF CHANGE.

"The Times, they are a Changin" was Bob Dylan's song of 1964. The issues were civil rights, the war in Vietnam, long hair and the Beatles' visit to the US. Those issues, as important as they were, seem dwarfed by what we are facing.

The war against Covid-19 rages on with increased vengeance; racism has yet to be dealt with and the recent storms and wildfires in the US are a reminder that our industrialization, the pride of the developed world, has moved us toward global warming and a possible point of no return. **The times are a changin' indeed**. The world is a mess.

This gets added to the regular worries about family, friends, unemployment, health etc. It is not that our lives are devoid of blessings - they aren't - but accumulated stresses send us in search of hope.

In the midst of writing this I received on my Facebook page, from Sara Hagos, one of the refugees that we are sponsoring, two texts: **Psalm 119 and John 6**. These biblical texts, which she sends regularly, are in Tigrinya, her language, but the references are in English so I am able to look them up. **In Psalm 119 Sara has allowed herself the luxury of lament.** It is **176 verses of a plea for deliverance from oppression**. The last verse states. "I am wandering like a lost sheep. Come and look for me." **Sara knows the value of being able to grieve**.

The text from John's gospel is the story of the feeding of the 5,000. A boy steps up and gives away his lunch for the common good. All are fed - with

leftovers to take home. It is a text infused with hope. So, thank you Sara for two timely texts. The faith and courage of Sara and her family are an inspiration for us all.

Stepping forward and giving something up for the sake of the common good might just be a way of healing the world, and us. It is hopefull. As the writer John might say, "Do that and you will be surprised what God can do." However, it will mean many difficult changes. Are we able to do it? We live in hope. GW

Our churches are adapting to new ways.



MOVING FORWARD

This October, **Rev Jane VanPatter will** join the ranks of retired ministers of Oxford. Here is her retirement farewell.

So long! Farewell! Auf Wiedersehen! Good-Bye! Those words remind me of a song. In the early 1980's while serving on my ordinand pastoral charge, I received my first Pension statement from the United



Church of Canada. It indicated that my retirement year was 2020. Suddenly I had an inkling of how Moses may have felt leading the Exodus and wondering he as went, "Are we there yet!?" Though the

Song of Faith of the United Church of Canada had not yet been penned, it was indeed a song of faith in my heart that would sustain me throughout all the ups and downs, twists and turns, expectations and un-expectations and yes even a pandemic throughout 40+ years of ministry including two summer student minister field placements. This faith journey has led me from my hometown of Oakville, Ontario to ministry in New Brunswick, on to Manitoba where I worked with an Indigenous community, to New Brunswick again, then Saskatchewan spending one year as "the minister's wife" (lol!) followed by clergy couple team ministry in eastern Ontario followed by a move to London, Ontario for David's new ministry position while I accepted part time ministry positions first on the Harrietsville-Mossley PC and then at Fairmont UC. When our four children were older, I returned to full time ministry at

Thorndale and Zion UCs and eventually arrived at St. David's, Woodstock where I have been blessed to serve in ministry for 13.5 years. Along the way I have enjoyed serving on both the former **Presbytery and Conference Education** & Students Committees. I also took my turn chairing Oxford Presbytery and chose as my theme song for that year, "Dance with the Spirit." **Two London Conference** trips led by Bill and Karen Butt are indelibly marked in my spirit. The first trip was to Hokkaido, Japan to meet Rob and Keiko Witmer and experience the church from a whole new perspective. What a gift it was, and a humbling one at that! The second trip was to Mozambique, Africa. This one remains one of the most profound experiences of my faith journey. Seeing sand dams being built and the difference the dams made in such a positive way, providing water for the people in the communities to grow their own vegetable, something to behold. The Pedra girls program teaches life skills, promotes selfesteem, and gives young girls hope for the future by encouraging them, with the help of bursaries, to further their education. This trip in particular has opened my eyes and stirred my soul in matters of social justice and has found me singing yet another song, "My Love Colours Outside the Lines", in recent years. Looking back to the beginning of my ministry, I laugh when I remember thinking my retirement in 2020 seemed like such a long way off and wondering if I'd make it to the finish line intact. Now I find myself wondering where the time has gone. How is it that I am there already? As my active ministry winds down, I offer a shout out to you, my friends in faith in Oxford County. May you fare well and

Refugee update Oct. 2020




In the next two weeks all United Churches in Oxford will be getting by email an updated story of the refugee families we are sponsoring along with this new poster (see to the left) and guide.

"A STEP FORWARD" – A UCW VIRTUAL EXPERIENCE

On Sat., Oct. 3, 2020, 103 UCW members from Antler River Watershed, Western Ontario Waterways and Horseshoe Falls Regions gathered on Zoom for a program entitled, "A Step Forward".



The 1 ½ hour gathering was well worth every minute spent online.

Kathywelcomed everyone to the Zoom Gathering. **Win Czum**, from Horseshoe Falls UCW,

introduced **Beulah Hayley,** President of National UCW.

Beulah's greetings were based on Matthew 21:22, "Whatever you ask for in prayer with faith, you will receive".

Ann **Reiber** from Western Ontario Waterways introduced the guest speaker, Rev. Dr. Japhet Ndhlovu, UCC Program Coordinator for S. Africa and S. E. Asia. Rev. Dr. Japhet spoke about the ongoing UCW project, "Women for Change Zambia". This not-for-profit organization works to uphold gender equity and equality. By the end of 2019, the UCW has sent \$35,000 for girls' education and scholarships. With this money 20-30 girls from grades 10 - 12 will receive an education. There are 500,000 children in Zambia that receive no education. Girls and young women need money, uniforms, and equipment to attend schools. Girls often suffer gender violence, pregnancy, and early marriages. The motto is, "Take a girl back to school". We can help!

Rev. Sandra Bendall from Antler River Watershed lead us in worship. Rev. Sandra

based her worship on Luke 9:10-17, "Feeding the Five Thousand". She reminded us that during this Covid pandemic we must turn to God and pray for it to run its course. CURRIES UNITED CHURCH



The origins of a church in Curries began in **1855** with the purchase of land by the East Oxford Congregation of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada. church was called Zion and built east of the current building where the parking lot is. In **1861**, land was purchased to the east for a burying ground. The Zion Church was part of the Woodstock circuit and later the Oxford Circuit. In 1874, it became part of the newly formed Oxford Centre Circuit. In **1885** land to the west was purchased for the construction of a new church. present church was built here in 1891. Pews from the old church were used in the balcony of the new church. The former church building was moved to the north and became a hall, then a school, and was eventually purchased by the municipality and converted back to a community hall. It was demolished in **2012**. The site of the former church became a parking lot and still contained a horse shed and outhouse. A wooden porch ran along the south end of the new church allowing folks to descend from a carriage and then enter the building.

In **1892** a row of spruce trees was planted along the west side of the church. Today, only two of those trees remain, positioned between the church and County Road 59 (then known as the Norwich Road). In **1906** the manse was built across the road directly west of the church.

The completion of the Port Dover and Lake Huron Railroad in **1874** brought rail service to the community. The rail line crossed the Norwich Road at the Curry farm south of the church. Thus, the community became known as Curries Crossing. A station house was placed there, which still stands today. The house sits on an angle to the road as it was positioned to face the rail line. The name of the cemetery was changed from Zion to Pleasant View Cemetery in 1899 and, according to records, the name congregation was changed to Curries in 1903. In any event, in 1936 the rail line was removed, and the name of the community was shortened to Curries. In 1950 the horse shed was removed



garage, that still stands just to the north of the church. In 1953, the wooden steps were removed and replaced with concrete ones. By 1955 water was installed, and in 1957, the washrooms

were added on the north end of the building.

although a portion of it was retained as a

The present church was built by Mr. Merrill of Norwich, who was a prominent builder, and is identical to the church that he built in **Bright.**

For many years, Curries was one of the largest rural congregations in the region. The Women's Missionary Society was organized in 1892. In 1913, a second group, called the Helping Hand **Club** was established. This group was very active in sending socks, sweaters, and food to soldiers during the First World War. After the war, they supported the upkeep of the manse and the church. In 1953 they became the Women's Association. and in 1962 they merged with the Women's Missionary Society became the United Church Women. They continued to serve the church and

provided lunches and banquets for many church and community events.

As well, there were numerous youth groups and an active Sunday school. **The Sunday school met for an hour either before or after the main service until 1995**. At this point, the Sunday school began to operate during the church service.

In spite of having some good ministers and committed volunteers and lay people, our congregation continued to age and dwindle.

Attendance steadily declined with

Attendance steadily declined, with fewer marriages and baptisms, and more funerals and people moving away.

Faced with rising operating costs plus the upkeep of an aging building, we held numerous suppers and concerts to help pay the bills. Fundraising became a permanent endeavour and we became increasingly financially dependent upon a handful of households. In spite of this, we continued to support community outreach and contributed generously to the Mission and Service Fund.

By 2019, we had lost several more prominent members, attendance hovered around 15 people per Sunday, and our financial outlook was bleak. By October 2019, our minister Rev. Sarah Grady accepted another call. At this point, we had difficult decisions to make, along with our sister church, Oxford Centre United. A vote was held, and we decided to disband.

During the past year, we have moved forward with the process of disbanding and selling our building and possessions; a process made more difficult by the current pandemic that also compounds our sense of loss and isolation.

On September 27, 2020 we celebrated our 165th Anniversary and Decommissioning Service; socially distanced in the parking lot.

Thursday, October 8, I was grateful to join the Oxford County Health Coalition and UNIFOR 636's Day of Action to draw attention to the Long Term Care Facilities in Oxford. I am grateful that it was a beautiful sunny fall day for a drive, and I could drive! Some (like my brother) are confined to a wheelchair in private care facilities where the care givers are truly wonderful. But shareholders' profit is more important than how the facilities are staffed. It is important to have fulltime employees at all levels of training who can ensure continuity of care, as well as adequate care of 4 hours every day for each resident. I was part of a 6-car cavalcade driving by the private long term care homes in Woodstock, Ingersoll, Tavistock and Tillsonburg with magnetic signs reading All long-term care should be public.

I was energized to be part of the provincial Day of Action and appreciate the efforts of Bryan Smith of Oxford Coalition for Social Justice and UNIFOR for organizing this. Read the article from Heart FM.
