

Christmas in the shadow of Covid-19

It's the season of darkness and light. Take **a drive**

through the neighbourhood and you will see everything from soft lights on humble cedars, as subtle and as unassuming as light through a stable window, to front yards filled with enough light to outshine the Bethlehem star.

Covid-19 has cast a long shadow over the world. These are dark days. But a vaccine has been announced so there is light in our darkness. **We may hear the stories of Jesus' birth differently this year**. We may pay more attention to both their darkness and light.

The stories of Jesus' birth come from Matthew who and sometime after the year 85. In the year 70, Rome laid siege to Jerusalem, destroyed most of the temple and killed over a million people, most of them Jews. Moreover, by this time Jesus' disciples had all been killed and if you were caught saying that Jesus instead of Caesar was Lord, you would suffer the same fate. Those dark days called for new stories of faith. So, we have these "wonder full" stories telling us that God, and not Caesar was still in charge: light in a darkened world.

The stories are filled with unexpected twists and turns, with much love, risk and irony. Caesar calls people to register for a new tax. That brings Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem where Jesus is born, fulfilling the prophesy that the Messiah will be born in Bethlehem. Angels announce the birth to marginalized shepherds and not High Priests. Jesus is shut out of the Inn as he

will be shut out not by Jews but by Jewish authorities. King Herod is tricked by three astrologers from Babylon, of all places. The holy family escapes to Egypt because of Herod and in doing so the prophesy of the Messiah coming out of Egypt is fulfilled. These stories that lift the marginalized and make the powerful mere pawns in God's grand plan would have delighted and encouraged the struggling first century faithful.

So, we gather this Christmas in the shadow of Covid-19. These ancient stories become our stories. We no longer take health or life for granted. I find myself feeing thankful for each new day. On Christmas Eve, we will remember the front-line workers who are the heroes of our time. We will think of the collective grief of people of all nations and the Christmas where so many will be alone, cut off from families. We may hear the gospel stories with more clarity and have our hearts strangely warmed. We may even recall the words of John's gospel who gives us just one sentence that describes Christmas: "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness does not overcome it." And that's the good news!


Think about McLaren's quote: let it challenge you to evaluate your life and faith. Allow God's Spirit to shine in and through you this Christmastide.



Sweaburg United Church welcomes all to our church for 11am Sunday services.



We are happy to share Jeff's words telling us a bit about himself, his faith journey and his call to come to St David's UC and Oxford.


Like many families, my family during my early

My grandmother couldn't drive so she went to church with her sister-in-law, my great Aunt Betty, who was a Presbyterian. So my formative years were spent in the Presbyterian Church. It was from St. Andrew's, St. John's that I felt the call into ministry. It was from there that I was ordained to the Ministry of Word, Sacrament and Pastoral Care way back in 1990. In that community of faith, I discovered the love of God. I still receive their weekly mailings and I have a special place in my heart for the people there.

OXFORD UNITED REFUGEE SUPPORT COMMITTEE (OURS)

Our refugee families face more danger than just the virus this Christmas. (Read Gwynne Dyer's December 3, 2020, article in London Free Press.) The families in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, say it is not safe at this time for them to be in the streets.



(In the poster to the left, everyone is in refugee housing in Addis Ababa except for Bisrat who is in Khartoum, Sudan.) While the fighting with the Tigray Peoples Liberation Front (TPLF) is over for now, in the

northern state of Tigray, the families we are sponsoring are among the 6% of Ethiopians who speak Tigrinya, the language of Eritrea and those in the state of Tigray. That may identify them as targets of harassment.

Our thoughts and prayers are with them in this Christmas season. GW

Change.org PETITION - A call for urgent intervention to stop the abduction of Eritrean refugees in Ethiopia

We may feel helpless to change what is happening to our sisters and brothers in Ethiopia but signing a petition to the United Nations is both a possible and an important action. Habte Zekarias of London, our co-sponsor of Sarah's family, is a member of the yaakil grassroot movement coordinating committee Canada and he encourages us to sign this petition which has been organized by Eritrean Yiakl Mass Movement.

Habte, who has sources on the ground in Ethiopia, writes 'there are about 105,000 Eritrean Refugees in 3 camps where the war is going on. While the United Nations Human Rights Council (UNHRC) has a mandate of protection it has, in fact, abandoned them with no food and water, hundreds of children are dying, women are getting raped every day and recently 6,000 men have been kidnapped and no one knows where they have been taken.'

This petition calls the authorities and Humanitarian organizations to intervene and to call the Ethiopian government to protect Eritrean refugees in its jurisdiction and allow access for food and water delivery to the camps. The hotlink to the petition is here.

PEDRA PROGRAM - Mozambique From June 1999 to July 2010, Bill and Karen Butt were overseas personnel for the UCC in Mozambique. One hears the love and pride in their voices as they share the ongoing success of their work there.

The PEDRA program for girls' education, run by the former United Church partner the Christian Council of Mozambique, still is thriving. Some of the older girls these days sew protective anti-covid masks for distributing to people who can't afford them. They also learn and practise anti-covid hygiene and teach it in their neighbourhoods.

The girls in the photos are what are called in Portuguese educadorinhas, literally 'little teachers', or what we would call teacher helpers, or volunteer junior or auxiliary teachers. They're 15-16 years old, have been in PEDRA for at least 5 years, and help teach the younger girls. Their names are Adelina (the 'I is pronounced like 'ee' in 'feel'), and Cheila (pronounced 'Shaylah'). Look for more about Adelina and Cheila in CONNECTIONS January and February 2021.

Loving, Grieving and Healing

'The magic is in the sharing' someone said as we reflected on the personal grief

of a mutual friend. To me, the sharing felt like 'God's Spirit

flowing to mend our hearts' after someone or something we love dies. This month we report on the Forum on Ecological Grief part of For the Love of Creation which we reported on in November CONNECTIONS pg10. (The national initiative to address Climate Justice of Canadian faith communities and faith-based organizations.)

This more personal report acknowledges that grieving that is honoured can bring about healing and new life and that a safe place is important when attempting to unblock repressed or ignored grief. In this forum, we engaged



in an exercise using this spiral image of the dandelion (a gift to Joanna Macv from artist Dori Midnight) and which shows the movement from the source of Gratitude (the root of

dandelion), through Honouring our Pain (the green leaves), Seeing with New and Ancient Eyes (the flower), and Going Forth (the seeds). (While any spiral image shows movement, reframing the bothersome dandelion is genius!)

Given our short time on the zoom platform, I still found it valuable to move through these stages. First, **grounding my gratitude that feeds my soul** (the

wilderness camp our family has enjoyed for decades); honouring all our pain which blocks the energy which feeds our souls (the future for both grandchildren and those in vulnerable places); seeing with new and ancient eyes the flower of new life (the life giving attitude of our grandchildren who help me to see possibilities); and coming to the place where I could sing with faith 'I won't be frightened anymore'. Singing moves our energy! For me, ecological grief is different than other grief and I commit to continue this exercise with others regularly.

Resources: These sessions were experiential and not recorded. Robin MacDonald (of Heartland), a grief-support practitioner and Anna Bigland-Pritchard, a musician used the work of Joanna Macy - (environmental activist of over 40 years, scholar of Buddhism and Work that Reconnects deep ecology). Network is a valuable resource database for articles, meditations, songs, prayers, and more. You can listen to Jaylene Johnson's album Potter and Clay. The leaders recommended this grief work as a regular monthly spiritual practice and emphasize doina it collectively amongst a trusted group. Since then, I've modified it to use for an opening worship for a social and ecological justice group. The intent is self-care and not to establish policy, etc. Contact the editors if you would like more information. MM
