The Peace of Christ - a work in progress (part one)

"May the peace and the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with you" is how St. Paul began his letters to churches in lockdown. I could not think of a better greeting. Also, I want to examine "the peace of Christ."

In the season of Christmas we may have heard Isaiah's word that the Messiah would be called the "Prince of Peace" and suggested that **peace was not only personal but political**. "Swords will be made into plough shares and spears into pruning hooks..." and on the road to peace, the valley's will be filled, and the hills lowered.

We have heard Jesus' birth stories in which angels announced "Peace on earth" to poor shepherds in Luke's gospel and a week later heard the delightful story of Jesus being taken to the temple where he is met by old Simeon and even older Anna who has lived in the temple for 84 years.

Notice the role reversal, which is part of peace. It is old Simeon, not Anna, who takes Jesus in his arms. He is so touched that he breaks into poetry that includes both Jews and Gentiles. Anna was married for 7 years and even if she was married at age 14, she would have been 105. She must have ached for at least 90 years to feel the warmth of a baby in her arms. But here is Anna, running on fumes, but with new fire in her belly, rushing to the main part of the temple, interrupting prayers, telling surprised worshippers that Jerusalem will be liberated from rule, Roman an announcement punishable by death.

Simeon, with love in his arms, states that his life is complete, and he can now die in peace. Anna, even at arms length from Jesus, now has a new reason to live.



There is peace when one feels overwhelmed by love; when one feels

connected to all people and, we would add, "to all creation." But putting your life on the line by telling oppressors that their days are numbered, is also an expression of the peace of Christ.

At the same time that this story was being read in our churches, women's rights' activist Loujain al-Hathloul was being sentenced by the Saudi government to 6 years in prison for speaking out against their oppression of women. It is the work of peace. Anna would be proud. To be continued. . .

The North was our CANAAN Exploring Sandwich Town's Underground Railroad History

The secret system of codes used by freedom seekers and abolitionists in the clandestine network known **Underground Railroad:** Detroit known as "Midnight" and Canada, on the other side of the Detroit River, was known as "Canaan." The North Was Our Canaan tells the rich story of Sandwich, Ontario (now part of the city of Windsor) (https://collections.uwindsor.ca/omekas/nwoc/page/video) and bears witness to those who sought freedom at the risk of capture to build community as well as bricks for their church in 1847.

These uniquely Canadian Resources were recommended by Professor Miriam Wright, of the History Department of the University of Windsor. Miriam is the daughter of Glen and Pat Wright.

An old friend is hurting.

I have an old friend who has been ignored by most of us for years – well not exactly ignored - but for sure not cherished. **She was present at all our celebrations, but in the background**. So mostly people didn't notice her beauty and grace; didn't cherish her unique healing powers. Eventually they were so busy celebrating – birthdays, anniversaries, or a deal they got at the shopping mall, that **they DID NOT notice how quickly she was changing**.

She'd opened her arms, provided food when they were hungry both from the land itself, and food from the creatures that lived on the land. She'd provided shelter from the rains and the snow. She'd provided the means to make clothes.

She'd given of herself generously and allowed folk to take her most precious gifts; EVEN the ones that couldn't be replenished. Some shared, taking only what they needed; others took much more in order to make themselves wealthy and then just threw the rest away.

My old friend gave even when it hurt and began to destroy her; even when it hurt and began to destroy others. Still, she continued to give and give and give. And we continued to take and take.

It is her nature to give, to nurture; to be a vital part of creation.

She was around when we placed the last nail in the trans-Canada railway.

SHE IS AROUND AS WE BATTLE COVID

But we took her for granted and didn't cherish her.

My old friend is Mother Earth, and like the LGBTQ2S, the Black Lives matter, and the oppressed children in Palestine, AND the poor who are homeless or about to be homeless because of climate change, she feels abused disrespected and grief.

For too long, we've ignored how she has provided for us. We have 10 years left. Every one of us – regardless of our sexual orientation, the colour of our skin, how we describe God/Mystery/Allah, our income level, our HOMELAND – WE ARE ALL needed. She is our livelihood.

We need all hands-on deck to work together to save her. Working together we can learn to cherish Mother Earth and to love one another.
