FOOD FOR THE SOUL

The Peace of Christ –
Part Two – Restoring the
Family

When Jesus said, "My peace I give to you, not as the world gives . . . " he did not spell out what the world was offering. He didn't have to. Everyone knew all too well how that first century world was broken. It was a world of the acceptable and embraced at the top and the unacceptable and shunned at the bottom. That social curve was steep and nasty. At the top were Jewish men and boys; at the very top were men with religious titles such as Priests and Levites. Not so important were women and girls. At the bottom were Romas, Samaritans, divorced women, people with physical or mental illnesses, thieves, and Jews who colluded with Rome, such as tax collectors.

Jesus' peace work was to flatten the curve; to identify the hypocrisy of the perceived "righteous", to embrace the shunned and change their story.

Jesus tells the story of a good Samaritan and the not so good Priest and Levite. When the ten people who had Leprosy were healed, Jesus can't resist telling people that the only one who came back to give thanks was a Samaritan. When the five times divorced Samaritan woman came to the well in Samaria, Jesus asked her to help him get water and offered her the "living water." He then engaged her in а theological conversation as he would have done with a fellow Rabbi. Suddenly, she had a new story and a new life. She was part of the family. When a Roman Centurion came to Jesus and asked him to heal his daughter, Jesus obliged and said he had never seen such faith. When tax collector Zacchaeus climbed a tree to get a better look, Jesus invited him down and

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asked to go to his home for a meal, a custom afforded only family or close friends. Zacchaeus was instantly transformed from hated tax collector to friend of Jesus; from outcast to member of the family.

To use another metaphor, these people had been unfairly "framed". Jesus took away the confining societal frames and replaced them with the frameless love of God. He was acting out what he had said to his disciples, "The kingdom of God is within you." That work was and is the peace of Christ.

May the peace of Christ be with you; and may you be the peace of Christ for others. *To be continued. . .*





WHAT HAS COVID TAUGHT ME LATELY?



Under Lockdown these days I have had time to learn **the joys of reminiscing. looking back over eighty years**. I begin to see patterns that emerge from the

generations, from the routines of life, the physical and mental quirks passed from fathers to daughters, from mothers to sons. Even events in the church and community pop up new as life moves along.

For example, **back in 1948** when I was a recent immigrant to Canada and a recently confirmed member of the United Church, on fire with new faith and anxious to serve God both in my community and in my world, I joined the YPU (Young People's Union) in my local congregation. There were a dozen members all determined to make a difference. But how?

One of the four United Churches in Bermuda, all part of the Maritime Presbytery of the UCC, had lost its roof in a hurricane. It was a small poor congregation like ours. The roof would cost \$400.00 to repair. So, 12 young people pledged to earn \$100.00 between us, through Lent up to Mother's Day, so that at least the Bermuda Church would have 1/4 of their new roof.

Times were not great in Oxford County. \$25 a week was the average working man's wage. Most of us were farm kids who had regular daily chores to contribute at home plus schoolwork and church activities of choir practice, Sunday School and Worship. Some had music lessons or team sports which took more of their time. But we were determined. We set a goal of adding at least 50 cents each per week to our project - \$6 a week minimum.

February 10, 2021 Page 7 of 10 We could earn 3 cents per quart picking strawberries for a farmer in the area who had a fruit stand. Several busy women would pay 50 cents an hour for childcare occasionally. Another farmer needed a field of beets hand hoed and thinned and would pay 50 cents a row. Another family needed rubbish carted to the dump. No iob was paid more than 50 cents an hour but with persistence we each made our weekly 50 cents. We prayed hard and we worked hard. We had help: the Sunday School decided to give their Birthday money, (1 cent for each year from everyone who had a birthday) to our project; the Ladies Group gave proceeds from a bake sale after Church one Sunday. So, on Mother's Day Sunday, when all our pennies were added up, thanks to God and to everyone who had worked so hard, we had \$157.40! Alleluia! Off went the money and back came a fervent thank you from Bermuda.

Now we are in another time of difficulty because of Covid. Our congregations are wondering how to earn funds to continue to serve our community when we are unable to use the events we have been used to organizing. I was wondering, for example, how we might help Operation Sharing from now until Easter. The need is great, and our means are not. Reminiscing has given me an idea.



We can donate 25 cents every time we shop in Woodstock or Ingersoll at Shopper's Drug Mart or grocery stores Foodland, Sobey's and Food Basics. That money goes directly to distribute Food Cards for non taxable items. Perhaps you are faithful about giving your quarters; perhaps you have never put a guarter in

for the Foodbank of Operation Sharing at the cash. These days as I only go to the drug store and to the grocery store, I could put in \$1.25 for the cause each week. There are more than 100 people in St. David's UC and 3 United Churches in the City. If we all prayed hard and were faithful, together we could give over \$300 a week. In 10 weeks, that would be \$3000 which is more than most money-making events garner.

Can you make this your preEaster resolution? "I will faithfully give \$1.25 to Operation Sharing by remembering to give 25 cents every time I go into one of these businesses." Olga Mckellar


