




Jerusalem - East 4 (i)

Here too we come to crux. Not so fine to focus comfortable mind on these last hours. Triumphal Entry's joy could still be ours – where wakened stones proclaim and branches sign the welcomes of Christ's coronation shouts onto fair Jerusalem's bright air. But shouts awoke the worm, and burrowing doubts sour the fruit of joy. Enemies take care to follow and accuse. From donkey colt to Pilate, comes a slide to the abyss of others. So Christ comforts lost revolt born dead inside a friend's last ghostly kiss as gardens weep for Pilate, and calls His fate to take Him now, till crowned at Heaven's gate.

It's told in bits: four scenes out of order as if a tale too manifestly sad for visiting straight out. See in the border of Christ's most plundered hour the dozing heads of his best friends, to whom he'd offered all. In front of him the thorns; in angel's cup Betrayal's bleeding yet to come, a call through Solitude's resplendent dark. Look up to where full darkness took him. Faithfuller friends crowd close dismayed, helplessly still yearning for God to disappear the cross. But ends were drawing tight, the dull pace of our learning left Him no other choice. So we're led deep: into Gethsemane's interrupted sleep.

The Peace of Christ – Part Three.

We could call it a peace parade. We all know the story; Jesus on a donkey, surrounded by cheering, palm waving followers heading toward Jerusalem.

March 10, 2021

On another road, from the opposite direction, according to Jesus scholars Crossan and Borg, there was another parade; a grand display of Roman infantry and cavalry, a deliberate show of strength and power by the Empire, in case there was any doubt about who was in charge.

Jesus was equally as intentional. The book of Zechariah states, "The Messiah will ride into Jerusalem on a colt. The war chariots will be driven from Israel and the soldiers from Jerusalem, (9:9-10).

When Jerusalem came in sight, Jesus wept and said, "If you only knew the way of peace". (Luke 19:44) Jerusalem had been taken over by Pax Romana. Rome's version of peace was to conquer and hold. In the conquest of Palestine in 63 BCE, they moved into Jerusalem, took 2000 prisoners, then crucified them. They then put in place a governing council and priests who were compliant with the purposes of Rome. The temple became the center of government and the headquarters of taxation. Wealthy landowners confiscated peasant farms and moved into Jerusalem as part of a wealthy When Jesus aristocracy. arrived Jerusalem and proceeded to overturn the money changing tables in the temple, he was not just protesting the fact that forgiveness had to be paid for, but the temple had become an instrument of Rome's power and control.

Jesus knew well that the consequence of challenging Caesar was death by crucifixion. So, on that fateful Friday, to all who were present, it appeared that the Empire had won. It took just over 36 hours before the news began to spread that it had not. Despair became hope; tears of deep sadness became tears of great joy!

We are familiar with Robert Frost's "Two roads diverged in a wood, and I, ${\bf I}$ took

the one less travelled by. And that has made all the difference". The same could be said of parades.










Black History-An Ingersoll Story

Once again, Five Oaks has opened their doors to contribute to Canada's food security. The first group of 48 farmers to quarantine is set to land in the first days of April. **They need our help.**

Preparation for the guests includes staying in communication with farm managers, scheduling arrivals, making modifications and updates to many of the spaces on the property, and collecting items needed to host the guests. Five Oaks is calling on the community for donations of items such as:

- Mini fridges or apartment sized fridges
- Bookshelves
- Small dressers
- Small area rugs or carpet runners
- Warm sweaters and coats
- Spanish language items like novels, magazines, crosswords
- Coffee makers
- Kettles
- Games, Cards, Puzzles
- Art supplies

Five Oaks is a not-for-profit Interfaith/Intercultural spiritual centre, originally founded in 1952 as a United Church training facility offering its own retreats, programs, and summer camps, and provides a sacred natural setting for facility rentals by groups and personal retreats, with cozy rooms, meals from an on-site chef and 117 acres of forest and trails on Grand River.



An Idea that Blossomed in a Pandemic! Norwich United Church (NUC)

Early in July, on an impulse, I sent a note to Five Oaks asking if they might have some resources or suggestions for our Shepherding Elders at NUC. Not only were we without the services of a minister, the Covid-19 restrictions were making it much more difficult to maintain contact with the people of our We needed some new congregation. strategies and some compassionate support to be more effective in offering pastoral care.

Fortunately, despite the usual summer holiday disruptions, Judy Steers, Program Animator at Five Oaks set up a phone chat to discuss ideas. immediately recognized our need to keep connected and "fed" during a challenging time. Following that first conversation she met with her colleague, Karen Eade and the two of them started brain-storming ideas for offering a new program that would be tailored to our requests yet might have broader implications for other groups similar situations. Early in the fall, the three of us met on a Zoom call. Karen and Judy had the broad outlines of a series of workshops and were in the process of applying to Edge for a grant to assist in this development.

As we were not comfortable with meeting in person, Karen and Judy concentrated their attention upon making a series of on-line workshops that would designed to foster а sense community amongst the team and give us a new model for considering how to reach out and offer effective pastoral care. Eventually we had a total of 12 people with internet connection and a desire to be a part of this initiative. We met over three Monday evenings in late January and early February.

workshops were well-designed to encourage people to talk and to share freely with no sense of judgment. The strategies were presented with good visuals and discussion and one of the facilitators kept notes as we conversed.



These notes were sent out to all participants following the workshop. We were encouraged to share how each one of us approaches the task differently, but appreciated how we used our unique talents and the technology that was available. We came away with a fresh sense of how we could connect more effectively and why we do the things We also recognized one another as part of the same team and realized how important it is to support one another in this work. Since our final session on February 8, we've had an additional Zoom meeting with only the local participants to follow up on our discussions and also review the lists of people we serve.

Karen Eade and Judy Steers have generously offered to host a follow-up Zoom meeting shortly after Easter to check in on us, offer suggestions and any further resources that might be useful.

We felt valued, supported and armed with a new sense of camaraderie through this experience. Indeed, it feels like this was a positive result of all the Covid-19 restrictions! We were proud to be the trial group for this new program "In A Strange Land" now being offered to others through Five Oaks. We heartily recommend it based upon our experiences with Judy and Karen.





> We had not heard of the progress of the application submitted November 5, 2019 for Sara and her



How can we help heal Mother Earth? MM


