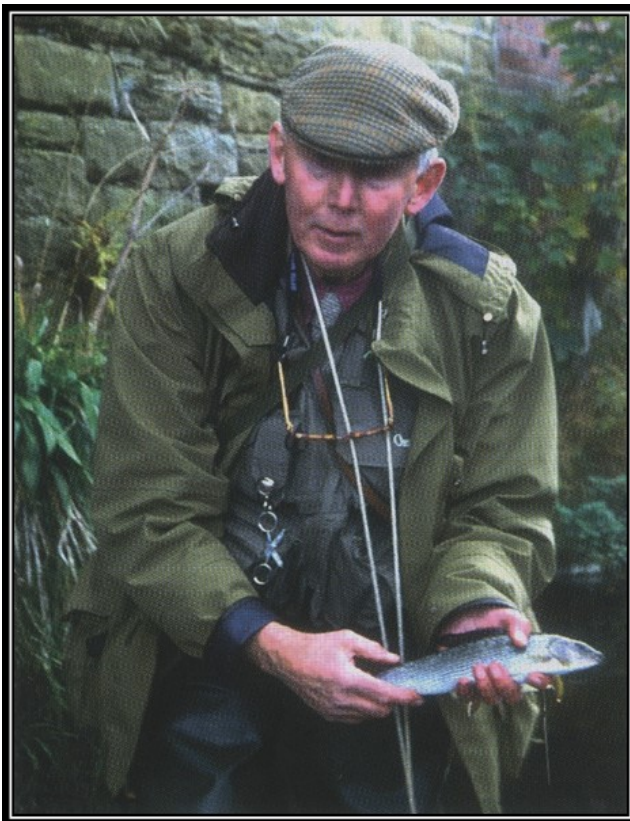




THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

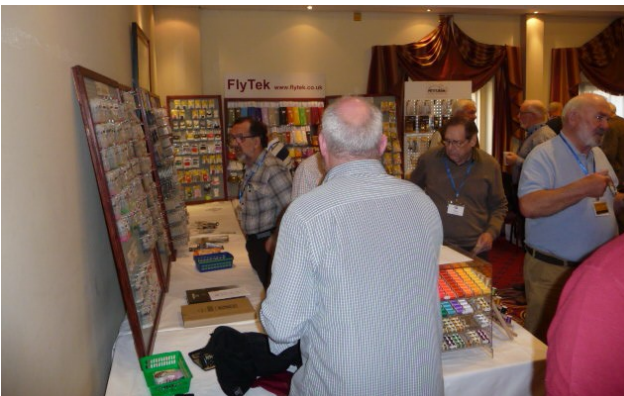

Fly Tiers Corner



Double Badger

This is one of the iconic flies for fishing for both Trout and Grayling. It has been classed as a fly for Derbyshire but works extremely well over all types of rivers. What natural it represents is unclear, but what is clear is when adult flies are on the water, this fly can work well.

Materials

Hook; Partridge # 14 /16

Silk; Pearsall's No 8 (Purple)

Body; Peacock Herl

Hackles; Badger Cock (Size to match the gape of the hook)

Method.

- 1 Wind silk from half way down the hook shank , down to just onto the bend.
- 2 Wind the silk back for two or three turns to form a bed for the rear hackle.
- 3 Tie in the hackle and wind forward for two or three turns, tie off the hackle and remove remainder of the hackle.
- 4 Tie in two three or four Peacock herls, depending on the size of the hook, twist into a rope and wind forward to 2/3 down the hook shank. Tie off the herl and cut off the extra herl.
- 5 Catch in the front hackle, wind forward for two or three turns, tie off, remove the extra hackle and whip finish.

Staff with some knowledge of grayling ecology within the Environment Agency, Natural Resources Wales and Scottish Government (in England, Wales & Scotland) should find the document informative and of use in protecting and safeguarding the future of UK populations– it is not a panacea but should help to guide the reader, be they fisheries professional or keen amateur, in the direction of useful knowledge, technical advice and practical assistance.

A river assessment checklist and simple flowchart in the appendices, should help identify potential issues causing / contributing to declining populations or life-cycle bottlenecks.”

RECYCLE YOUR FISHING LINE

What has this got to do with line recycling?

The amount of line UK anglers send to landfill or incineration every year would reach to the moon.

384,400 km

How do I recycle my fishing line?

Step 1

To find out where your local recycling point is you have two options;

Visit the Anglers National Line Recycling Scheme Facebook page where you will find a list of all participating shops/venues.

Visit our website www.anglers-nlrs.co.uk

Step 2

Keep your old monofilament and braid separate and take it along to your chosen recycling point. The shop may have separate bins for braid and mono but if they have a single bin please keep the braid bagged and place this in the bin.

Step 3

No recycling points near by? You can post it to us via ANLRS, c/o Tools n Tackle, 11 Bridge St, Newhaven BN9 9PH.

How is it recycled?

The waste line is sent to a recycling processor that returns it to a useable material. Recycled nylon is currently used to make traffic cones, wetsuits and sports clothing.

INVASIVE AQUATIC SPECIES
CHECK-CLEAN-DRY

Are you unknowingly spreading invasive species on your water sports equipment and clothing?

Invasive species can affect fish and other wildlife, restrict navigation, clog up propellers and be costly to manage. You can help protect the water sports you love by following three simple steps when you leave the water.

CHECK

Check your equipment and clothing for live organisms - particularly in areas that are damp or hard to inspect.

CLEAN

Clean and wash all equipment, footwear and clothing thoroughly.

If you do come across any organisms, leave them at the water body where you found them.

DRY

Dry all equipment and clothing - some species can live for many days in moist conditions.

Make sure you don't transfer water elsewhere.
