Fly Tiers Corner



Materials,

Hook; #18 and 20 Orvis A800 or similar claw type hook.

Tail; Grey Partridge neck
Thread; Versus dark olive.
Hackle; Med olive grizzle.

Thorax; Olive fox squirrel dubbing.

Post; Grey or dun coloured Antron or polypropyl-

ene yarn.

Body; As thread

Method.

- 1) Tie in the post at a point where bend begins. If tied on top of the hook, trim the butts at an angle and tie down around the bend to start to form the body.
- 2) Tie in the Partridge feather secure with a couple of turns and pull through so the tips are short.
- **3)** Start to wind thread back in touching turns securing the feather butt and completing the body.
- **4)** Finish just before the wing post. Trim off the Partridge feather.
- **5)** Select an olive grizzle hackle. Pull off the fluff at the base. Present feather at base of post, hackle stem towards the eye.
- **6)** Tie stem down towards eye. Secure and trim stem. Bring thread back to post and dub a little s
- 7) Wind hackle up the post around 6 to 8 turns, then similar back down hook. Secure by tying off hackle at the base of post and trim.
- 8) Stroke hackle fibres back towards bend thus doubling the fibres
- **9)** Bring thread in front of post and unclip the post from Gallows Tool.
- **10)** Dub the tying thread with squirrel dub and wind forward to form the thorax.
- 11) The thread should now be behind the eye, and pull the post and doubled hackle over the top of the thorax and tie off post starting with a couple of turns then give the post a tug, this will pull hackle tight over the thorax, and secure. Whip finish and trim post.

The nice thing about this pattern is that there are a number of sizes it can be tied and with materials to suit

RECYCLE YOUR FISHING LINE

What has this got to do with line recycling?

The amount of line UK anglers send to landfill or incineration every year would reach to the moon.

384,400 km

How do I recycle my fishing line?

Step 1

To find out where your local recycling point is you have two options;

Visit the Anglers National Line Recycling Scheme Facebook page where you will find a list of all participating shops/venues.

Visit our website www.anglers-nlrs.co.uk

Step 2

Keep your old monofilament and braid separate and take it along to your chosen recycling point. The shop may have separate bins for braid and mono but if they have a single bin please keep the braid bagged and place this in the bin.

Step 3

No recycling points near by? You can post it to us via ANLRS, c/o Tools n Tackle, 11 Bridge St, Newhaven BN9 9PH.

How is it recycled?

The waste line is sent to a recycling processor that returns it to a useable material. Recycled nylon is currently used to make traffic cones, wetsuits and sports clothing.
