Coq de Lion Feathers

I have managed to acquire a limited number of various colour of excellent quality Coq de Lion feathers from a breeder in France. They come in bunches of 12 feathers and are sustainably sourced. The feathers are collected from the free range cockerels once a year before being given anti biotics to ensure the birds are free from any infection following the removal of the feathers. By using this method to obtain the feathers the breeder can ensure the quality and health of his poultry stock and the quality of the feathers. I understand that the majority of Coq De Lion feathers on sale today are exported from Spain to America and obtained from cockerels which are killed.

Fly Tiers Corner



Little Red Sedge

This is my version of a standard fly that has been around for many years and has had a number of variations. It has been tied over the years with a variety of wing materials from the original Red Game Cock to natural Squirrel Tail (When it was available, but thankfully no longer, Red Squirrel Tail was used for the wing). It has always been a successful fly on all waters when sedge of most sizes we around. The yellow tag is supposed to represent an egg case.

Materials;

Hook; Partridge SLD # 14 or 16

- Thread; Brown 8/0 Uni Thread
- Hackle; Red game cock
- Body; Chestnut coloured Cock Pheasant Tail
- Wing; Chestnut Coq de Lion
- Tag; Fluorescent yellow floss

Method;

- 1) Catch in the thread and wind down the shank of the hook to a point just passed the bend of the hook in touching turns.
- 2) Catch in the yellow floss, cut off the excess and form the tag.
- 3) Tie off the floss and cut away the excess before tying in 2 strands of Pheasant tail.
- 4) Twist the Pheasant tail around the thread and wind forward almost to the hook eye, tie off and cut off the excess pheasant tail.
- 5) Catch in the Coq de Lion wing a little way back from the eye of the hook ,leaving enough room for the hackle. (note; the Coq de Lion are liable to flair when tied in so, to reduce the flair take 2 wraps of thread around the base of the wing and carefully wrap the thread around the hook. Practice makes perfect on this technique!!)

6) Tie in the hackle wind forward (4 or 5 turns) tie in the hackle cut off the excess and whip finish. I sometimes trim the hackle points underneath the hook to form a firm foot.



RECYCLE YOUR FISHING LINE

What has this got to do with line recycling?

The amount of line UK anglers send to landfill or incineration every year would reach to the moon.

384,400 km

How do I recycle my fishing line?

Step 1

To find out where your local recycling point is you have two options;

Visit the Anglers National Line Recycling Scheme Facebook page where you will find a list of all participating shops/venues.

Visit our website www.anglers-nlrs.co.uk

Step 2

Keep your old monofilament and braid separate and take it along to your chosen recycling point. The shop may have separate bins for braid and mono but if they have a single bin please keep the braid bagged and place this in the bin.

Step 3

No recycling points near by? You can post it to us via ANLRS, c/o Tools n Tackle, 11 Bridge St, Newhaven BN9 9PH.

How is it recycled?

The waste line is sent to a recycling processor that returns it to a useable material. Recycled nylon is currently used to make traffic cones, wetsuits and sports clothing.
