From Your Pastor

Dear Friends,

With the turn of the calendar we enter the season of Lent, a time of examination and discipline; of commitment and challenge. We are invited to slow down and follow Jesus' footsteps to the cross.

But how? How do we slow down when life seems to be moving around us at a dizzying pace? I read recently that it took 38 years for radio to reach 50 million listeners and 13 years for television to reach 50 million viewers. But the same threshold of 50 million users was reached by the Internet in only four years, and by Facebook in just two years. Any way you look at it, it is hard to fathom the escalating rate of change in technology in the world around us. And add school and sports and other activities into the equation...


How can we keep up with it all? And how can we possibly slowdown long enough to focus on following Jesus?

The good news of the Gospel is that what was relevant two thousand years ago remains relevant for us today: Christ lived for us; Christ died for us; and Christ rose again from the grave for us. Our God is the Lord of all times, and what is most relevant for us in this time and place boils down to two things: loving the Lord our God and loving our neighbor as our self.

The question is: are we more influenced by God or by the world around us? In Chinua Achebe's latest book, he makes this astute observation: "Without a doubt, the times in which we live influence our behavior, but the best or merely the better among us...are never held hostage by our times." They are free to redirect their attention to what is most important. And during the season of Lent, what becomes most important is Jesus' journey to the cross.

Lent is a time to refocus and see everything anew through the lens of Jesus Christ and his followers. This year, through sermon and Bible study, we will explore Lent through the eyes of those who



Along with these first followers of Christ, may we make the commitment to slow down, come into his presence, and learn from those who followed him to the cross. "O taste and see that the Lord is good; for happy are those who take refuge in him." (Psalm 34:8)

"Faces at the Cross" Led by Pastor Jeanne Thomas

Our four-week Lenten Bible study will explore the journeys of four different followers of Jesus who were with him at the cross: Nicodemus, Mary Magdalene, Mary of Bethany, and Simon of Cyrene.

My hope is that, by reflecting on the ways in which Jesus and his cross touched these individuals, we, too, will have our lives touched in new ways and with new depth. Each session will be based on the following Sunday's sermon.

Music Ministry

I hope everyone is staying well and healthy!



As the season of Lent is approaching, you will notice there is more reflective music. On March 1st, the Bel Canto Ringers will play "My Faith Looks Up to Thee." The choir will be singing "Pie Jesu" by John Conahan, a New York City based composer. It will be sung in Latin. The lyrics translate as follows:

Merciful Jesus,
Who takes away the sins of the world,
Grant them rest,
Everlasting, Rest.

This month, our All Church Choir will be presenting "Deep River" with "Shall We Gather at the River?" arranged by Lloyd Larson.

On March 15th, "The Majesty and Glory of Your Name," an arrangement of Psalm 8 by Tom Fettke, was chosen to enhance worship. The piece builds in a most unique way. You will hear "O Lord, our Lord, how excellent is Thy Name. O Lord, our Lord, how excellent is Thy Name... how excellent is Thy Name," chanted in the sanctuary. Then the choir will sing one movement from Mendelssohn's *Elijah No. 29*, "He Watches over Israel," with texts from Psalm 121. And for Dan Forrest's "Near My God to Thee," Elizabeth Brown (cellist) will return and play the obligato part and perhaps another piece or two, to enhance the Lenten Season music.

Now, I would love to share the **Easter Cantata** with you...



After we sang *The Road to Bethlehem* in the winter, we will have *The Road to the Cross* for our Palm Sunday Cantata. We will begin our Palm Sunday introit with the Chancel Choir singing and Joann Mitchell on the flute. Then, we will go on to the cantata! Pieces include: "Prayer of St. Francis" and "Hymn of Peace" by Mary McDonald, "Here Is Love" by Dan Forrest, "Evening Prayer" by Ola Gjeilo, and "Filled with His Voice" by Steve Danyew. The piano and our own Michael Talento on saxophone will accompany the choir for that morning! Michael will be doing improvisation during "Evening Prayer". The motivation for choosing the music was Matthew 26:36.

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane, and he said to his disciples, "Sit here, while I go over there and pray."

We will find prayerful, peaceful, reflective music from the Chancel Choir that morning.

Stay tuned next month as I will share the Easter Sunday music plan. But for now, let us begin our Lenten journey!

In other news...




You may have noticed a number of blue covered buckets hanging from some of the trees at our church. If the trees had leaves on them, you might be able to more easily guess their purpose. Here's the story...

A few weeks ago Buildings and Grounds was approached by a local minister who has a hobby of making maple syrup. He had noticed that we have quite a few sugar maple trees on our property and asked permission to tap them for their sap. B&G did some research and consulted with our member Earl Ebling. Earl does the church landscaping and lawn care and he confirmed that it was safe for our trees. The gentleman was given the go ahead to tap our trees.

The sap of sugar maple trees contains a much higher concentration of sugar than other trees. The sap flowing season is relatively short, only about six weeks. What causes the sap of maple trees to flow in the spring? When temperatures are warm and above freezing, the sap begins to flow. If it cools below freezing, it stops. Since we have had an unusually warm winter so far, some of the buckets have already gained an inch or two of sap. Tap holes are put in the tree and the sap flows from the tap hole into the bucket. It is important to note that when the tapping is complete, all tap holes will be sealed to prevent any infection in the trees. It is comforting to know that no damage to the trees is caused in the process. It is estimated that tapping removes only 10% or less of a tree's sugar, an amount too small to hurt a healthy tree under normal environmental conditions.

Stay tuned... We expect, down the road, to receive a small amount of the finished maple syrup, hopefully enough for a taste test.

Cole Robinson earned his Eagle Scout rank on September 26th, 2019 from the St. Anastasia Boy Scouts of America (BSA) Troop 315. Since the BSA inception in 1911, only four percent of Scouts have earned this highest rank attainable in the Scouts program. Cole joined Cub Pack 315 in the first grade and remained an active Scout until he turned 18 and aged out. His Eagle community service project was an education campaign to raise awareness of the serious dangers of texting and driving. Marple Newtown High School was the key beneficiary of the Eagle Scout project; and with the help of fellow Scouts, Cole's campaign educated hundreds of people in our community on the dangers of distracted driving and they collected over 260 signed pledges of drivers committing to not text and drive. Cole is thankful for the support of his family, friends, community and church to enable him to achieve the honor of becoming an Eagle Scout.
