RUBBISH REPORT



The 2020 Rubbish Report is a snapshot of rubbish removed by Clean Up Australia volunteers across the nation, the Report is based on the count of 365,922 rubbish items from 1,274 surveyed locations (445,251 items from 1,002 locations in 2019).



2020 participation reflects the impact of COVID-19 on volunteer capacity to join with their neighbours and friends to clean up their favourite locations.

Despite local lockdowns and restrictions, Australians continued to Step Up to Clean Up with only a 0.3% reduction in the number of registered activities across the nation.

This clearly demonstrates the importance volunteers place on our local parks, streets, beaches, waterways and bushland and we applaud the estimated 683,242 volunteers who donned a mask and gloves during 2020

NOTABLE CHANGE

Packaging continues to dominate rubbish counts representing 49.8% of all reported rubbish during the year. This is on-par with 2019, during which packaging represented 50.3%

Beverage container counts continue to - reflective of the impact of decline well-established container refund schemes. In 2020 they reflected 15.5% of counted rubbish. In 2019 they accounted for 17.9%

Soft plastics have been separated into their own category for the first time in 2020. Counts include plastic food, retail and garbage bags, plastic confectionery wrappers, cling wrap and 'other' soft plastics. 2020 volunteers counted 33,562 of these items through their reporting, representing 13.7% of all surveyed rubbish and 40.4% of plastics.


NOTABLE CHANGES

While decreasing their % representations, cigarette butts remains the #1 item reported by volunteers. In 2020 they represented 16.2% of all reported rubbish which is a welcome decrease of 5.8% over 2019. While small, the environmental impact of a cigarette butt cannot be underestimated. Leaching toxins and leaving small pieces of plastic in their wake – every littered butt provides immediate, short and long-term danger for our precious flora and fauna

challenge – hard plastics will outlive us all, and they and their soft plastic cousins rip with the danger of entering the food-chain

evidence of 'container hunting' in states where the redemption scheme is new, but established states are reporting decreased

wrappers, lids and pieces of glass dominate the Top 10 list, accounting for 30% of Top 10 reported rubbish



While parks are always a popular clean up location, volunteers reported that these and their local streets were more easily accessible during COVID-19 lockdowns, when activity was restricted to short periods of socially distanced outdoor exercise. Plastic items were the dominant rubbish type reported at these locations – representing 40.6% of rubbish reported in parks and 30.3% of that counted along roadsides.



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
