

## **NOTABLE CHANGES FROM 2018**

- Miscellaneous items increased by 7%, polystyrene by 3% and paper by 1%
- Glass decreased by 10% and metals by 1%
- · Plastics, wood and rubber remained consistent

### **NOTABLE CHANGES FROM 2018**

### Within grouped data:

- Non-food packaging items increased by 20.1% as a percentage of all rubbish reported, and illegally dumped household items rose by 4.1%
- Less significant increased were recorded in beverage container counts [0.6%] and beverage related rubbish [1%]
- Decreases were recorded in counts of food packaging [-9.3%], chip & confectionery wrappers [-3.9%] and plastic bags [-1.3%] beverage related rubbish [-2.3%], toys and sporting equipment [-0.8%], plastic bags by 0.1% and construction waste [-1%]
- Toys, sporting equipment, straps and ropes remained consistent over the last two years
- In 2019, Clothing replaced non-identifiable items within the Top 10 groupings

#### Within Individual item counts:

- Cigarette butt counts increased by 6% marginally behind South Australia as the second highest increase in Australia
- Plastic bottle caps & lids rose by 1% and pieces of polystyrene counts increased by 0.1%
- Decreases were recorded for foil chip and confectionery wrappers [-2.1%], alcoholic beverage bottles [-0.7%] PET drink containers [-0.5%], non-identifiable plastics [-0.5%], and plastic packaging [-0.4%]
- Plastic bottles and containers and pieces of glass replaced small pieces of paper and soft drink cans in the Top 10 counts

## **FAVOURITE CLEAN UP SITES**

Rivers/creeks were the most popular sites surveyed in 2019. Beach and coastal areas yielded the highest volumes of rubbish.

Shops/Malls reported the highest average number of items per community site at 1,709 – nearly four times the 2018 average count [459].

## **NOTABLE CHANGES FROM 2018**

# Five additional locations increased their average counts in 2019:

- Beach/coastal areas increased by 326
- · Parks by 229
- Rivers/creeks by 125
- · Roadways by 136
- · Bushland by 19

# Average counts decreased in three locations:

- Other [mixed] locations by 361
- Outdoor transport areas by 78
- · School grounds by 68
