Thoughts to Ponder by Donna Horton

Last month the Nature Center and volunteer staff enjoyed their twice yearly awards dinner. We recognized landmarks and achievements, and shared stories of the past season's more memorable moments. We also acknowledged the remarkable milestone of 25 years of interpretive programs and environmental education at the Nature Center. The first guided school tours went out in the spring of 1978, led for the most part by a newly trained volunteer staff.

Over the years, we estimate close to 100,000 students have passed through Oxley Nature Center's programs. More than 600 people have donated volunteer hours to develop and maintain trails, care for the habitat, build and repair structures, lead tours, and assist visitors. As autumn ended, the volunteer staff roster held 114 names. We hope they all come back to work again in the spring. It would be nice to add some new names to that roster. How about you? Ever wondered what it might be like to spend a few hours each week or month, helping make Oxley Nature Center work?

You hear comments behind you, on the trail. "Oh, yeah. I've seen that before. That's milkdud-weed."

Or..."See those bubbles? That's a bubble-snake down there. They do that."

Or... "Do you think she knows where we are?"

They come up to you with exciting news. "We saw a turtle! It was out of its shell!"

You get to witness the mental gears turning as young minds begin to work.

Upon finding scattered pieces of an armadillo skeleton: "Maybe its head fell off over here, and it didn't notice until it got over there."

Holding up a stag beetle jaw: "Y'all have really little deer around here!"

There are many good questions, but maybe we take some of the answers for granted.

"How are these leaves here on the ground going to get back up on those branches next spring?"

Or... "Is the butterfly inside the caterpillar?"

The letters arrive.

"Remember me? I yelled a lot."

And... "Thank you for wasting your time on us." And... "When we went to Oxley Nature Center it was the best day of my life." A visitor walks in, sniffing appreciatively: "What's cooking? It smells great!"

Flailing frantically, it heaves itself back onto the log, too hard, and goes off into the water on the other side of the log. As the bedraggled squirrel crawls back up onto the log and totters carefully away, you realize your own day hasn't really been so bad.

Sure, we give out awards to the good folks who volunteer at Oxley Nature Center each spring and fall. But what token can we offer that could match moments like these? What certificate can capture the beauty of a season unfolding before your eyes? Can a lapel pin compare to sharing that delight of the outdoors with others, either by maintaining the diverse habitats and the trails that run through them, or by helping visitors on the trails or at the visitor center? Volunteer some of your time this year, and find out what a "real" paycheck is. Come earn your nametag.

Double-walled Western Cherokee Basket

January 25

Linda Lou Alexander has been weaving baskets for 12 years. Join her to learn how to create this traditional basket of the Western Cherokee tribe. Reed will be provided for weaving this project.

Splash into Ink-Wash: Turtle Drawings

January 25

Brenda Knapp will teach participants how to capture the likeness of turtles in ink-wash (working in diluted ink in layers-allowing the artist to achieve the depth of rich India ink in subtle variations of grey). Silver Shells: Drawing in Silverpoint

Brenda Knapp will be teaching this classic art form of drawing in sterling silver, a precious metal that creates delicate, fine lines that invite close-up study of a drawing.

Drawing and Detailing Fossils

February 22

Brenda Knapp will teach you how to study the details and textures of a fossil. Pre-sketching and measurement, graphite application, and dusting and erasure drawing techniques will be used.
