

#### The Tale of Two Turtles by Eddie Reese

When I was a boy of 11, my little brothers and I would ride our bicycles out to Otter Creek and go fishing. The best fishing hole was hard to get to because half the trip was down railroad tracks and then down a trail through the woods. We would tie our fishing poles and canteens to our bikes, tell Mom where we were going and pedal the three miles out of town. On one of these fishing trips I met the most infamous of all turtles. Well, almost. My red and white bobber didn't do anything unusual. It just bobbed once, swirled a little, and went under. I yanked back hard on the line and knew I had a big one. We almost never got it to the surface and discovered it was a large turtle. But not just any turtle, an alligator snapping turtle. I'd heard about these. If they bite you they won't let go until it thunders. It was July, there might not be another thunderstorm until September. I wanted to get my hook out of his mouth. It was the only one I had left. I was in trouble. How do you get a fish hook out of the mouth of a very upset snapping turtle without getting bitten, and it might not thunder until school starts. Lucky for me Willie Adams was there. He drove his old car down the railroad right of way and across the pasture to the fishing hole. He was too old to get there any other way. He had white hair and skin as dark as night from sitting on the creek bank all summer. He became very excited about my catch. Said he would get my hook out if he could have the turtle. "They make great soup" he said. To get the hook out all he needed to do was get his "turtle tools" out of his car. I didn't know what turtle tools were but I figured it was bad news for the turtle. I got my hook back and Willie had turtle soup

For many years I thought I had caught an alligator snapping turtle. It turns out that in Southwest Kiowa county there aren't any alligator snapping turtles. We were four counties away from their native range. I had caught a common snapping turtle which are found throughout the state. I thought I'd caught an alligator snapping turtle because I suffered from a common disease I call WMS (Water Moccasin Syndrome). We see it all the time at the nature center. Every snake in the water is a water moccasin and every turtle in the water is an alligator snapping turtle. In truth there are alligator snapping turtles at the nature center and if you are lucky you might see one. Most likely you will see its cousin the common snapping turtle. There are differences. The common snapping turtle has a saw-toothed upper edge on the tail, the alligator snapper does not. The alligator snapper has three large ridges running lengthwise on the carapace that end up looking like large, pointed bumps. The common snapper lacks these as an adult but has saw-tooth projections on the back edge of the carapace. They both like any body of water with a muddy bottom and aquatic vegetation. Both open their mouths and wiggle their little worm-like tongue hoping some unfortunate fish will mistake it for food and get too close. At night they forage along the bottom eating whatever they catch. Common snappers eat some plants, about a third of their diet. Usually it's only the snout of the turtle sticking out of the water as it comes up for a rare breath of air. They rarely bask on the bank like other turtles do and normally only the females come out of the water. I hope you see one of these fascinating animals some day.
