You are invited to **BioBlitz**, a celebration of biodiversity at Mohawk Park, on September 9 and 10, 2005.

BioBlitz is a rapid inventory of biological diversity done once each year at a select site in Oklahoma. It is an exciting scramble to find out how many different kinds of plants, animals, and other living things can be found in

the target area during 24 consecutive hours. It serves as a one-time "snapshot", a brief but revealing view of how many different kinds of living things share this part of our world with us (right on the edge of the city!) This year, the target area is one of the largest municipal parks in the U.S.—Mohawk Park!

BioBlitz is hosted by the Oklahoma Biological Survey and conducted by volunteers from around the state. Teams of biologists search for and identify mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish, invertebrates, plants, and monerans—as many living things as possible. A running tally is displayed at the base camp, and final results are announced at the BioBlitz grand finale.

This is an exceptional opportunity for everyone to meet with scientists, learn about field techniques, see some secretive and unusual critters, and enhance awareness of the inhabitants all around us in the meadows, forests, waters, and even along the roadsides. Prepare to be amazed!

Join Oxley Nature Center and Tulsa Zoo staff and volunteers on Friday evening and Saturday for some special activities and presentations. See enclosed insert for details. We hope to see you there!

A \$2 per car Mohawk Park fee will be charged weekends April through October. The west gate will be closed. Oxley members get in free. OXLEY AND REDBUD HOURS:

The gates at Oxley Nature Center are open daily, with the exception of most City holidays, from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. At Oxley, you may park outside the gates from 7:00 a.m. - 9:00 p.m. to walk the trails even when the gates are closed.

At Redbud Valley Nature Preserve, the gates are open Wednesdays through Sundays, from 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. You may **not** hop the fence when the Nature Preserve is closed: on Mondays or Tuesdays, on City holidays, before 8:00 a.m., or after 5:00 p.m.

Saturday, September 3, "Bright Planets" 7:30-9:00 p.m. Have you been watching the bright planet Jupiter and the even brighter planet Venus drawing closer and closer to each other in the western sky at sunset? Weather permitting, we'll peek at them through the telescope tonight! Bring binoculars if you have them, and perhaps a chair or blanket to sit on.

Wednesday, October 19, "Autumn Stars" 7:30-9:00 p.m. We'll learn how to connect patterns of stars to find heroic figures in the night sky. We may get a preview of our neighbor Mars, which will grow very bright in our sky this month. Bring binocuars if you have them, and something to sit on.

Coming in November: "Mars Watch II" will take place Friday and Saturday, November 11-12 at the Polo Field in Mohawk Park. Oxley will co-host this event with the Astronomy Club of Tulsa. Telescopes will be available to view a brilliant red Mars as it lines up with Earth on the same side of the sun. Watch for more information.

Wonders Never Cease

I was looking through "The Red Book" the other day. This simple, college-ruled, 5-subject notebook contains documentation of significant sightings recorded by staff naturalists over the past 15 years. The entries are intermittant, and dependent on both individual perspective and collective agreement. What is noteworthy, and to whom?

Many clues; some brief, written in pencil in an apparent rush; others penned with obvious excitement, emotion, and detail; lay quietly in the pages of this nondescript notebook.

They may offer insight into a piece of the puzzle that makes up something as grand as migration in nature:

"Sept. 28, 2000-Gorgeous weather this week! Monarch migration at its peak. Reba found, ... east of the teaching shelter parking lot, a tree festooned with monarchs!"

Or they may speak to someone's expression of joy at their discovery of a remarkable sight:

"Sept, 1990--Several bobcat sightings near the interpretive building ... one was seen catching a rabbit and walking away with it ... one adult and 3 kittens were seen drinking at the north end of the pond ..." They may point to the emergence of possible patterns. In September and October, monarchs, kettles of hawks. and other birds are heading south; while various species of sparrows, juncos, and towhees are coming from the north to spend the winter with us. Raccoon, woodchuck, armadillo, coyote, bobcat, and squirrel have appeared near the bird feeders to thrill us with their presence. The worker bees have dragged the drones out of the hive to die. The animal kingdom is very busy now.

Great change is in the air. Years of journal entries speak of "record-breaking heat and drought in July and August". This only to be followed with: "Sept. 23, 1999-Finally-it RAINED!" Years of September entries mention "cold fronts" dropping the daytime temperatures into the low 70's. October days offer frosty mornings, and "October 8, 2001-First freeze. 26 degrees!", promises relief from summer heat.



So what is noteworthy? Why don't you come out and decide for yourself. I guarantee you will see something we don't. Hear the end of the summer chorus of insects. Feel and smell the change in the air. Let the child "in you" or with you embrace the season!
