Seasonal Changes By Amy Morris

Today the breeze whispers of change in the air. It has been coming. Some days it comes in great wails of wind and driving rain that lay the tall prairie grasses and forbs over. The next day, the grasses raise up their prone and prayerful forms, stretching skyward again, rejoicing in a new day's sun.

Change marches forward.

Days are much shorter now, shadows longer, the sun casts its light from an angle that lends a unique quality to earth, sky and water. Familiar trees have altered the color in their leaves. Where once were varying shades of green, now are riotous and playful splashes of reds, yellows, and oranges.

On a windy day, swirling leaves float softly to the ground, raining rainbow shapes around our heads. As winter progresses, more fragile ones will fade to a tracery of veins, becoming silvery skeletons. The tougher ones, like oak, provide shelter for a multitude of local residents. Beneath piles of fallen leaves tenants receive a bounty of welcome warmth, moisture and food.

Soon the trees will be bare. Colors become muted, softened, while textures stand out in sharp contrast. This is when we see the bare bones of our trees, their form and branching patterns. Look too, at the patterns of the bark. Each species wears a characteristic outer "skin", though each individual tree will vary.

The very dark checkerboard pattern on the persimmon sets it apart from all other trees, even if all of its signature orange fruits have been consumed by resident coyotes, foxes, raccoon, opossum, and other hungry critters.

Often, you will find several persimmon trees, (the northernmost New World representative of the Ebony family) growing together in the same area. Even without leaves and fruit, we can identify most all of our forest denizens.

Without cover of leaves, if you look carefully, you may find the nest of a kingbird in the crotch of a branch overhead. This bulky, unkempt nursery was built with stalks of weeds, grasses and moss, then lined with mosses and plant down. Its job completed, it will not survive the winter intact.

Look further, and you may find more of these amazing creations. The beautiful vireo nest is a deep-cupped woven basket suspended in the horizontal fork of a slender branch. This small nest belies its strength. The wall of grasses, paper, bark strips, rootlets and vine tendrils is securely attached to the twig with spider silk. Notice the lovely lichens lining the exterior. Who would ever see it, this little fairy cup in the woodland?

The gulls are wheeling, circling by the hundreds, their white forms in contrast to the gray sky. It is like a great dance, graceful and poetic. It is full of beauty, and yet.... there is a feeling of impending urgency. Winter brings hardship. It is about survival. We must keep moving.

Each season brings its own gifts. Come visit and explore the natural world in this season, you will find it constantly changing. What gifts await you: peace, adventure, discovery? You tell us.


