Sustainability: Every Day Choices by Donna Horton

"Liberty, Equality, Fraternity."
"Patriotism." "Freedom." These simple words, loaded with big ideas and alive with emotion have accomplished great things. "Ecology." "Conservation."
"Environment." When I first met these words, I thought they were also simple words for crusaders and world-changers.

What a let-down it was (at first!) to find out that college classes on ecology and conservation and environmental science had more in common with statistics and economics than with cleaning up creeks and saving the world. It took a while to understand that things are not black or white, good or bad, my way or your way. Every choice may involve complex sets of issues with positive and negative consequences. I am not so sure any more that "compromise" is the filthy word I once thought it was.

Some college classes were dry as dust and others were full of new ideas that made me think and re-think. All taught me that activism without the foundations and continual input of science and research has no integrity. It becomes unsustainable.

This country's founders hoped for an informed people actively participating in their government. In a similar way, the twentieth century's environmental activists wanted to engage and involve the average citizen. The slogan was "Earth Day Every Day."

Did we make it? In some ways, I have to say, "No." Every year we see a greater percentage of visitors that have obviously spent more time sitting inside than they have running and playing outside. However, many of them like the idea of "nature," and would like to do something to help. For the most part, their experience tends to be more based on what they saw on television or a computer screen than on what they have actually done. That's a shame. We need to work on that.

In other ways, though, the environmental movement is very much a success. I remember life before the Clean Air Act and the Clean Water Act and before the Endangered Species Act. Believe me, it may not be perfect, but it is much, much better. We may not have made it, but we are getting there.

And now the big idea in a simple word is "Sustainability." How can we all live together in this world without stripping it bare? What level of lifestyle is sustainable for 7 (soon to be 8) billion people? Can the whole world live like Americans? What does it mean, "to live like an American?"

Each one of us must decide that for ourselves, every day. What will I do today? What will you do? It all adds up. It all counts.

# 4th of July North American Butterfly Count

Join us at Oxley on Tuesday, July 3rd to spot, count, tally and identify butterflies. Information gathered is used to supplement the North American Butterfly Association (NABA) 4th of July Butterfly Count held annually in June and July.

Citizen scientists participate in local counts, increase their own knowledge, raise public awareness, and contribute valuable data about butterfly populations.

We will meet at 8:30 a.m. and count until dusk, weather permitting. You are welcome to participate in all or part of the count. Please bring a lunch, water, hat and binoculars if you have them.

Meet at the front desk at Oxley Nature Center. No experience is necessary. You'll work in teams with experienced naturalists counting in different areas.
