Where were you on November 4, 1983? It was my first day on the job at Oxley Nature Center. The 3-day regional workshop of the Association of Interpretive Naturalists, our professional organization, had just ended at Sequoyah State Park, my former place of employment. Instead of attending the workshop being held at "my" park, I had been busy with the move to a new place.

I still got to see everyone. They <u>all</u> stopped by Oxley Nature Center on the way home. Oxley had just been starting up when Oklahoma had last hosted the regional workshop. *Everyone* wanted to see the newest facility in six states. I stood at the desk greeting fellow professionals all day, answering questions like, "How many acres do you manage here?" and "What is your annual visitation?" with "I don't know, let me find out for you." The only question I could answer off the top of my head that day was, "Well, how long have you worked here?"

Looking back through thirty years here, I see the strengths of Oxley Nature Center and its relationship with Tulsans. The first named must be the Friends of Oxley Nature Center. Unwavering in their support, they have sent staff members to training. They have raised more than a million dollars over the years for much-needed expansions, repairs, and renovations. Keeping your membership current helps keep Oxley Nature Center strong.

The volunteer program is a tremendous asset. There is no way the tiny paid staff could do all that needs to be done. They lead tours, work on the trails, staff the front desk, and so much more. Even more importantly, the volunteer staff provide energy and enthusiasm. They recharge the batteries of everyone around. Think about putting in some hours if you can.

The friendly, generous, caring people of Tulsa are another factor in Oxley Nature Center's success. You love this place as much as the staff does. I see it every day. Share that. Tell others what you like about Oxley Nature Center.

Oxley Nature Center is fortunate in its paid staff. I can say that now, because I retire on January 1, 2014. The City has a treasure in the people who work for you, both the full-timers (now down to 3 people) and the seasonal staff (4 part-time positions). It's time to bring the paid staff back to full-strength, replacing the empty office manager position, my empty senior staff naturalist position, and restoring full-time staff naturalist positions lost in 2009 and 2010 lay-offs.

My position might not be filled. Lately the City has simply divided the work load among the remaining staff. Write your City councilor and Mayor Bartlett. Your emails and letters carry much more weight than staff requests. If each office received 5 or more letters in support of Oxley Nature Center, perhaps the budget makers would rate the employees who are stewards of 1000+ acres (one fifth of the City's property) as highly as police and fire.

Thirty years ago, Oxley Nature Center was the most cutting edge facility in the nation. Today it is barely hanging on, with the help of you and the Friends and the volunteers. It is remarkable what is done with "very little." Just imagine what could be done with "enough." Give this staff "abundance," and they'll put Tulsa on the map.

I have loved being one of your Oxley naturalists. Thank you for everything you have shared with me through the years. Now it's my first day again. Maybe I'll see you on a trail!
