"November 2-10, 2011. Peak of fall foliage color. Redbud Valley's color peaked before Oxley's and Oxley's peaked before the urban Tulsa vegetation. The spectacular color was all the more amazing because everyone assumed the long drought and furnace-like summer meant the leaves would just turn brown and fall off this year. Well, they did a lot of that in August. Then it rained in September. New leaves came out. Old leaves perked up.

Most years, fall color begins in August with early splashes of red among the sumacs. Then in September the Virginia creeper shows blood-red among the green trees. Gradually, each week another wave of color rolls across the state like a slowly developing color Polaroid.

This year they all chose the first half of November to put out their best colors. We usually judge the peak of color when there are some trees still green and some

trees already bare. It was hard to say any one day this year was "the peak of color". Perhaps it was the sixth of November.

The peak would have lasted longer, but ferocious winds tore the



leaves from the trees again and again. The cold front that came roaring through during the hayride on November 19 was probably the beginning of the end.

Even so, there are isolated pockets of magnificent color here and there, even well into December."

Hidden Colors

What happens to the green leaves of spring and summer? When trees are growing and producing food, leaves come in all shades of green. As the seasons change and day length becomes shorter, chlorophyll production is reduced and other colors come to the forefront. Red, orange and yellow hues are there all along in certain leaves. Chemical compounds such as tannin, xanthophyll and carotene show themselves as the colors of autumn. Get outside and enjoy them before the trees release all the leaves to the wind!
