I thought I was the only oddball who thought that way, and then I read this excerpt from a poem written by the Roman poet Claudian over 1600 years ago. We just celebrated the New Year a couple of months ago and as usual I was not impressed by the end of one year and the beginning of another by our accepted calendar. Although, I have to admit I enjoy the day off. Usually December 31 looks just like January 1 and nothing much has changed. And around this part of the world nothing changes much until late February. But it is those early changes that I look forward to. It is the new beginning of spring and new signs of life are making it seem like a new year is starting.

One of the first signs of spring I look for are bluebirds. They are here year round but in January the unattached males start singing to attract a mate and couples start looking for nesting sites. In February I look forward to seeing forsythia and jonquils blooming. Buds on the trees fatten and prepare to burst open. March can be frustrating. Some days are like spring and some are like winter...warm, cold, warm, cold. Eventually, winter gets tired of hanging around and disappears and all the while signs of spring are all around.

Bluets, Johnny jump ups, and spring beauties are some of the wildflowers that make their appearances in early spring. Those who don't make war on weeds in their lawns get to enjoy these tiny floral wonders. Then redbuds get their faint tinge of pink as their buds swell. Suddenly, one day it seems there are redbuds everywhere, in places unremembered. Don't forget to look for skeins of geese and ducks and pelicans making their way north. There are even kettles of hawks moving north. I was lucky enough to experience one of these last year. It was incredible, hundreds of hawks circling, riding the rising current of air up almost out of sight, then sailing north to the next rising column of warm air. It's one of those things you never forget.

And then April arrives, warm and friendly...well usually. She has her fits of storms and tornadoes but mostly she is nice to have around. That's when spring comes with urgency. I listen for the first warbler to sing in the tree tops, and look for the first indigo bunting and the first hummingbird. Really it is a time of firsts.

There are other spring "firsts" unmentioned, but I mark them all. Each one is a herald of hope, a harbinger of pleasant times, like a homecoming. By the way, if you didn't know, this noticing the changing of flora and fauna has a name. They call it phenology.

Maybe we come by this phenology thing naturally. It is useful after all. It tells me when to plant my vegetable garden, when to hunt for morels, and many other duties; which reminds me, I need to see if my lawn mower will start.

What if ...

this Spring, you take some time; from somewhere, somehow, however much you can manage. Step out your front door and gaze up at the stars in the night sky, or at clouds scuttling across a midday sky.
